Multiple construction projects set for Murray State University

There are multiple construction projects taking place on the grounds of Murray State University that will have a great impact for the University. All of this work will be important for recruiting students as well as the retention of students. The Fall 2022 semester will be the completion of multiple campus construction projects as well as, mark the beginning for other projects that will advance student community spaces, accessibility, and on-campus living.

A construction project that is currently taking place is the National Panhellenic Plaza which is being built outside of Waterfield Library. This project will be a monument to commemorate the historically Black fraternities and sororities that are on campus.

Lovett Auditorium's grand opening will be during the month of October. It is set for October 28th which is Homecoming week on the campus. It has been under construction for renovations since the spring 2021 semester. These renovations included all new seating, a new HVAC system, new curtain drapery as well as new windows.

Curriss Center is another construction project and the first part that will be worked on will be the old post office area which is going to be renovated to a new student involvement area. Once the Auditorium is finished the focus will be switched over to the Curriss Center because a lot of the events were held at the auditorium so they wanted to get that completely finished so events could start back up there. With a deeper dive into Curriss Center construction student life will be interrupted but that is why construction is going to be done in phases so that students are able to navigate the Curriss Center.

Another project will be the Private Public Partnership (P3) housing construction, phase one is set to be zoned off in December 2022 to minimize the impact on student life due to all the other construction going on as well. Springer Residential College was demolished for the new dining hall and the green space across from Hart College will be the grounds for two new residential colleges.

In regards to all the construction taking place, \$47 million was appropriated from the government to the University during the 2022 Kentucky Legislative session and Murray State actually added more money to the appropriation to make up for \$60 million for campus construction. Over the next one to two years there are plans to make great enhancements to the campus, meaning that pretty much every building on the campus will be touched with this money in some way (minor or major renovations) for improvements. Along with reflooring the bookstore there will also be other minor renovations to the front doors and windows, exterior renovations to the elevators to hide the inner workings and the inclusion of more student spaces.

Mason Hall and Oakley Applied Science Building will have renovations done in order to be compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act and therefore more accessible. The bathrooms in Oakley Applied Science have small doors which are not easy for wheelchairs to enter and Mason Hall has a wheelchair lift instead of a ramp alongside the stairs.

Jason Youngblood is the director of Facilities Management and he is the one that oversees all of these projects and any other construction projects that take place on the campus.

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Do you want to be a Severe Weather Spotter?

The National Weather Service is in need of more severe weather spotters. This is

volunteer based and the best part is, you do not have to leave your home for spotting. They are needing reports for as many locations as possible

so that neighboring counties can be helped as well.

The National Weather Service relies on trained volunteers to supplement Doppler

radar information on severe storms and tornadoes. Many hours are dedicated by the volunteers to learn about and detect severe weather. Weather reports from trained spotters are used along with Doppler radar data to issue warnings of tornadoes, severe thunderstorms, and flash floods. This is for anyone in the Southeast Missouri, Southern Illinois, Southwest Indiana and Western Kentucky areas.

The objective of the training is to provide the knowledge to identify and report key severe weather features. These training classes are free of charge and are open to anyone who may have interest in severe weather or public service. The classes contain photos and videos of recent violent tornadoes, storm damage, flash floods, hailstorms, and downbursts. The



“Spotters Concepts” class is around two hours and the “Elite Spotter Workshop” will take about three to four hours to complete. All the materials are provided and you will receive a certificate of completion at the end of both classes. For

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

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WKCTC receives \$210,000 grant to address Nursing shortage

PADUCAH, KY - West Kentucky Community and Technical College (WKCTC) has received a \$210,000 grant from the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE) Healthcare Workforce Collaborative Program. The purpose of the two-year grant is to expand training programs for in-demand healthcare professions.

Funding will be used by WKCTC to address the regional nursing shortage by creating a new, accelerated, fully hybrid Licensed Practical Nurse-to-Registered Nurse (LPN-to-RN) Bridge program for working LPNs. The project will feature newly designed courses, weekend clinical learning experiences, and nursing-specific student mentoring and support. Completion time for the new program will be 12 months, with the first group of students starting in fall 2023.

"This new program is designed for working LPNs who need a flexible program which allows them to keep working while they take the coursework to become an RN," said Vanessa Lyons, WKCTC nursing program access and success coordinator.

WKCTC has long-standing clinical learning and job placement partnerships with area hospitals and other healthcare providers. Shari Gholson, dean of nursing and allied health, said 100% of WKCTC RN students are consistently hired upon graduation.

"The quickest way to get well-prepared RNs into the area workforce is for LPNs to become RNs through the new accelerated hybrid program," said Gholson.

There will be no losers in this competition as every student group will give hope to 106,000 children and adults waiting on a lifesaving organ transplant.

Well, that is unless it's walk more than about a quarter of a mile from our vehicle. It's true. Most hunters don't hunt too far off the beaten path. Foraging Ground Cherries

Ground Cherries are ripe and ready to pick right now. But, you better hurry before the critters get them.

Ground cherries grow wild all over west Kentucky, along the fence lines and edges of fields and probably in your backyard.

This plant produces a small, yellow, edible berry surrounded by a papery husk. Ground cherries typically produce tons of fruit on each plant.

Ground cherries are in the Solanaceae family, along with eggplants, tomatoes, and peppers and more specifically the Physalis genus which also includes tomatillos. If you've

ever seen a tomatillo and its papery husk, ground cherries are very similar.

The ground cherry is an excellent source of Vitamins A, C, and B-3 (Niacin). They are also a good source of Vitamins B-1 (Thiamin) and offer Vitamin B-2 (Riboflavin) and the minerals non-heme iron, calcium, and phosphorus.

In my opinion, they have a taste similar to a tart tomato. A little sweet and a little tart.

Ground cherries can be eaten fresh, processed into jam, and baked into pies. Their distinctive, sweet-tart taste is great for preserves and sauces.

I made ground cherry preserves a few years ago and it was

delicious. Maybe the best preserves I have ever had.

Give ground cherries a try and you will love them too.

I can never seem to pick enough of them, because by the time they are ripe, the bugs and critters get them quickly. So hurry!

Be sure to positively identify any plants before using them.

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Ag Update

Corn Harvest has Started

Corn harvest has started over the entire county now, as a few farmers have been going for a couple of weeks but almost everybody has started now. Yields are extremely variable depending on

where, when and how much rain an area received. Yields appear to be worse in the southern part of the county and get better as you move north. This is a big generalization as there are better areas to the south and worse

areas to the north because the rainfall was so spotty.

In Graves and Hickman counties I have heard of many fields below 50 bushels per acre. The worst yield I have heard in Ballard county is 130 bushels per acre

First District Congressman James Comer visits with Kentucky soybean farmers

Kentucky soybean farmer-leaders were pleased to meet with Congressman James Comer in the Kentucky Soybean State Office in Princeton on Friday. Comer said that he's always happy to stop by and visit members of the agriculture community.

Comer, who served as a representative at the state level for six terms beginning in 2000 and was named National Republican Freshman Legislator of the Year during his first term, was elected as Kentucky's Commissioner of Agriculture in 2011. After a concerted effort to restore confidence in the agency, Comer spearheaded initiatives to grow Kentucky's rural economy and increase opportunities for Kentucky farmers.

After his election to Congress in 2016, Comer got right to work on a topic of great interest to farmers: the 2018 Farm Bill. Comer is the only formerly-elected state Commissioner of Agriculture in Congress, and he remains actively engaged on policy matters facing the agriculture community. In addition to serving as Ranking Member of the House Committee on Oversight and Reform, he is also a member of the House Committee on Education and Labor.

When Kentucky Soybean Association farmer-leaders visit Washington, D.C., Congressman Comer and his staff take time to

listen to their thoughts and concerns, and it's not uncommon for Comer to reach out to KSA leadership to get grassroots, boots-on-the-ground feedback on topics that can affect agriculturalists at the farm gate level. Both Comer and his staff are accessible to his many constituents, and the farm families of the First District appreciate both the accessibility and agriculture background that Comer brings to Congress.

The farm safety net was a topic of conversation, with farmers recounting their experiences with the current growing season's drought and (in many parts of the state) tornado damage, and how important and effective crop insurance is as an affordable component of that safety net. Kentucky soybean growers were relieved earlier this year to see USDA announce that its Risk Management Agency (RMA) has expanded double-crop insurance opportunities in more than 1,500 counties where double-cropping is an option. According to the map released in July, almost all of the soybean-growing counties in the Commonwealth now have coverage available under this new expansion.

Other priorities the group discussed included conservation, trade, energy (including bioenergy), rural development, research,

and nutrition.

Congressman Comer didn't leave empty-handed. Kentucky Soybean Association Legislative Chairman Shane Wells and President Brent Gatton presented him with a contribution from the Association's Political Action Committee (PAC) to help further his re-election campaign.

and I have heard of several over 200 bushels per acre. My early estimate is going to be around 175 to 180 bushels. This is much lower than last year and even though commodity prices are higher, rising input costs will have eaten up much of the profit this year.

I know a few soybean fields have been harvested but I have not heard any yield reports yet. You may have noticed many of the early beans are starting to change color and drop leaves. They are past the point where rainfall will do them much good. Most of

the double crop beans are still very green and look good and some timely rain will still help increase the yield. I have not seen many disease problems at all, dry hot weather tends to really limit plant disease problems.

In about a month it will be time to start planting wheat again. The price is still good and wheat will be a good option on ground that is owned or cash rented. It is not quite as attractive on land that is rented on shares. It is amazing how fast the growing season goes by. It seems like only yesterday we were

finally starting to plant corn after an extremely wet spring.

Please be patient on our roadways as farmers move from field to field. Be prepared to stop and back up or pull off in a driveway if you have to. Some of the roads have nowhere to go to get out of the way. Give it about 6 weeks and the rush will be over and then we can start the planning and work for next year.

Foods you should avoid giving to your pets

Many pet owners like to feed people food to their pets, some do it all the time others do it as a splurge for their pets. However there are many items that are not good for pets to eat. Most pet owners do their research and know what to and what not to give but there are still many pet owners that do not understand that certain foods can cause serious health issues due to the toxicity from the foods. The experts at Animal Poison Control Center

put together a list of toxic people food that you should avoid feeding your pets. Below are seven of those foods.

Alcohol– Alcoholic beverages and food products containing alcohol can cause vomiting, diarrhea, decreased coordination, central nervous system depression, difficulty breathing, tremors, abnormal blood acidity, coma and even death.

Avocados– Avocado is primarily a problem for birds, rabbits, donkeys, horses, and ruminants including sheep and goats. The biggest concern is for cardiovascu-

lar damage and death in birds and rabbits. Horses, donkeys and ruminants frequently get swollen, edematous head and neck.

Chocolate, Coffee and Caffeine– These products all contain substances called methylxanthines. When ingested by pets, methylxanthines can cause vomiting and diarrhea, panting, excessive thirst and urination, hyperactivity, abnormal heart rhythm, tremors, seizures and even death. Note that darker chocolate is more dangerous than milk chocolate. White choco-

late has the lowest level of methylxanthines, while baking chocolate contains the highest.

Citrus– The stems, leaves, peels, fruit and seeds of citrus plants contain varying amounts of citric acid, essential oils that can cause irritation and possibly even central nervous system depression if ingested in significant amounts. Small doses are not likely to present problems beyond minor stomach upset.

Coconut and Coconut Oil– When ingested in small amounts, coconut and coconut-based

products are not likely to cause serious harm to your pet however the flesh and milk of fresh coconuts do contain oils that may cause stomach upset, loose stools or diarrhea. Coconut water is high in potassium and should not be given to your pet.

Grapes and Raisins– Although the toxic substance within grapes and raisins is unknown, these fruits can cause kidney failure. Until more information is known about the toxic substance, it is best to avoid feeding grapes and raisins to dogs.

Macadamia Nuts–

Macadamia nuts can cause weakness, depression, vomiting, tremors and hyperthermia in dogs. Signs usually appear within 12 hours of ingestion and can last approximately 24 to 48 hours.

\$40 million State of the art sports complex to be built in McCracken County

The McCracken Fiscal Court, Paducah City Commission and McCracken County Sports Commission approved and signed an agreement to build and operate a state of the art \$40 million outdoor sports complex. The formal approval and document signing on Sept. 7 was witnessed by a large crowd at the Julian Carroll Convention Center, including about 100 student athletes from area schools.

Those student athletes and others to follow are the reason the county, sports commission and city came together to develop the complex at the former Bluegrass Downs Racetrack and Stuart Nelson Park. The complex is expected to be open in the fall of 2024.

It not only will provide recreational opportunities for area youth, but provide them an opportunity to fine tune their skills to earn college scholarships. It also will serve as an economic engine for the county's tourism industry and improve the quality



of life to attract new business, industry and residential development.

The reality of this project meets a decades-long desire to develop a tournament-quality facility to host major baseball, softball and soccer tournaments that will attract teams from multiple states. It also will provide quality fields for local youth participating in summer leagues.

The sticking point in development was find-

ing a way to fund construction and pay operating costs. But the financial hurdles were overcome through the efforts of the fiscal court that began coming together in 2019 with the adoption of a county transient room tax with revenue earmarked for recreation. County Commissioner Eddie Jones discovered the funding source by researching state law.

The transient room tax is not paid by local residents but by vis-

itors who rent motel and hotel rooms. It is expected to generate more than \$1 million annually, enough revenue to pay off bonds that will be sold to finance a portion of the construction cost.

Initially, the city and county will each contribute \$12.5 million toward construction. The city's share will come from proceeds of a bond issue that was sold a couple of years ago to build an aquatic center. However, that aquatic center project

was cancelled, freeing funds for the sports complex.

The county's \$12.5 million will come from federal funds allocated to the county as part of the post-COVID19 stimulus recovery package. The funds could only be used for one-time projects like the sports complex that will boost the economy.

Another major development was the availability of the Bluegrass Downs Race Track, which closed

several years ago. The owners of the former race track agreed to donate it to the county for the sports complex. Judge-Executive Craig Clymer negotiated the terms of the donation.

The next development was the city agreeing to partner with the county and to include Stuart Nelson Park as part of the development. Stuart Nelson adjoins Bluegrass Downs.

Without those developments, the project would still be a dream rather than on the road to becoming a reality.

The signing of the agreement is historic in that it demonstrates that the city and county can work together on major complicated projects. It sets the stage for other joint ventures to benefit the community.

At the Sept. 7 meeting, city and county officials praised the work of the sports commission for their volunteer work to plan the complex. A professional firm has been hired to oversee construction and operate the facility once it opens.

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KHSAA Board of Control approves amended sanctioning policy

LEXINGTON — The KHSAA Board of Control conducted its second regularly scheduled meeting of the 2022-23 academic year on Tuesday, Sept. 13, approving an amended sponsorship policy for potential new sports and sport-activities, as well as an expansion of officials licensing.

The threshold to sponsor a new sport will now be 15 percent participation among all member schools. Based

on a membership of 280 (totaled at the time of the most recent triennial survey), 42 schools must desire to participate in a sport for the Board to consider approving a new state championship. 10 percent of member schools (28) must participate in an existing sport for it to continue, with the currently implemented exceptions for female opportunities remaining in place.

The Board approved

a pilot program for 14-17-year-olds to be licensed as KHSAA officials eligible to work non-high-school-level contests. The KHSAA will help to defray the cost of training for these officials and work with local associations on appropriate mentoring opportunities. Background checks will be required once these officials turn 18 years old if they wish to remain licensed.

The Board also re-

viewed the consideration of potential revisions to the swimming championship format due to facility limitations and the football RPI (beginning in 2023), with much additional work and gathering of data to be completed before implementation.

Additionally, the Board took the following actions:

Approved a working budget report and a review of the terms of the

KHSAA's PPP loan; Considered several reports of ongoing business;

Reviewed the approved 2022-23 calendar with requests for any needed clarifications;

Discussed potential regional tournament format changes in team sports for regions with fewer than 16 teams;

Reviewed a regularly scheduled status update of the Bowling Green High School agreed

order; Reviewed an update of the 2021-22 disqualification report;

Reviewed the status of Bylaw 11 financial aid reports;

Received a detailed marketing sales status report from TPG;

Reviewed recently revised KHSAA staff responsibilities.

allowed her to accomplish something thousands of kids dream about each year!


