

Nevertheless, the good news now is that Paducah will be getting a new restaurant in this location known as Juicy Seafood. Juicy Seafood is a small restaurant chain with a few locations in the Greater Nashville Area, Chicago, Georgia

and Montgomery, AL. The restaurant has now leased the property previously occupied by TGI Friday's and hopes to have Juicy Seafood opened by this spring. Mark Robbins of Robbing Properties in Nashville, who also own the Paducah Shopping Center with Dollar Tree, TJ Maxx, Books-A-Million, etc., said the lease was signed with Juicy Seafood about a month ago. 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## 2018 General Assembly grants additional funding for Family Resource & Youth Centers

FRANKFORT, Ky. – More than 33,000 Kentucky students now have access to supplemental services at school thanks to the recent opening of 28 new Family Resource Youth Services Centers (FRYSC), or "friskies" centers as they are commonly called. Kentucky now has 854 FRYSCs across the Commonwealth.

The primary goal of the centers is to remove non-academic barriers to learning in order to enhance student academic success. FRYSCs may provide referrals to health services, tutoring, clothing, food and other resources to students and their families. In the 2018 General Assembly, the Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS) Division of Family Resource Youth Services Centers (FRYSC) was awarded approximately \$8 million additional dollars to further the work of these local school-based centers. FRYSC held a competitive grant review for eligible schools statewide, resulting in the creation of the new centers.

CHFS staff celebrated the additional centers with educators, students, legislators and community leaders at an open house at the Family Resource Center (FRC) at the Warren County school district's Henry F. Moss Middle School in Bowling Green.

CHFS Deputy Secretary Kristi Putnam said that FRYSCs are the bridges linking the cabinet with schools and their communities.

"FRYSCs staff help provide missing services that help strengthen families so children can focus on school and build a firm foundation in education," Putnam said. "Children's well-being and healthy development is one of this cabinet's top priorities, and these new centers expand our opportunity to support that outcome."

The new centers represent 33,225 students who will now have access to FRYSC services, which work to enhance students' ability to succeed in school by developing and sustaining partnerships that

promote early learning and successful transition in school, academic achievement and well-being, and graduation and transition into adult life.

In addition to opening new centers, a portion of the additional funding was used to reconfigure existing centers, allowing them to serve the school population more effectively. In total, 53 existing centers have been reformatted to maximize services.

FRYSC Director Melissa Goins said the services and referrals provided by the centers can have a wide and positive impact on long-term outcomes.

"The changes FRYSCs provide make children better students, and those students become better citizens," she said. "Our program coordinators have long been the first line of service for children and parents – recognizing signs of suspected child abuse, providing a link to job training and career services, and offering referrals to substance abuse, mental health and other medical services. Every center is unique to meet local challenges and best utilize local resources."

# Red Cross issues emergency call for blood donors

## Fewer drives, busy holiday schedules lead to blood shortage

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (Jan. 14, 2019) — A donation shortfall over the winter holidays is prompting the American Red Cross to issue an emergency call

for blood and platelet donors to give now to prevent a blood shortage from continuing throughout winter and affecting patient care.

The Red Cross

collected more than 27,000 fewer blood and platelet donations the weeks of Christmas and New Year's than needed to sustain a sufficient blood supply.

During this period, about 1,350 fewer blood drives were hosted by volunteer sponsor groups than required to meet patient needs as busy holiday sched-

ules kept many donors away.

"Many people may not realize that blood products are perishable, and the only source of lifesaving

blood for patients is volunteer blood donors," said Cliff Numark, senior vice president, Red Cross Biomedical Services. "When donations decline – as they did around the holidays and may further decline if severe winter weather and flu season pick up – lifesaving medical treatments could be delayed."

Right now, the Red Cross has less than a three-day supply of most blood types on hand, well below the ideal five-day supply needed to respond to emergencies and daily hospital needs. Blood products are currently being distributed to hospitals faster than donations are coming in.

"We hope people can resolve to save lives now – when there is an emergency need – as well as throughout the year," added Numark.

All eligible donors, especially platelet donors and blood donors with type O blood, are urged to make an appointment to give in the coming days to help restock the shelves for hospital patients. Eligible donors can find a blood or platelet donation opportunity and schedule an appointment to donate by using the free Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767). Volunteer blood drive hosts are also critically needed to prevent the shortage from worsening this winter.

*Who blood donations help*

In May 2018, 4-year-old Branson Gibby was diagnosed with neuroblastoma, a rare type of childhood cancer that affects certain types of nerve tissue after complaining of pain in his arms and legs and running a fever. After many tests, his mother, Erica Austin, was given the news that no mother ever wants to hear: her son had cancer.

Branson's 18-month treatment plan includes many rounds of grueling chemotherapy, surgery to remove the tumor near his kidney and spinal cord, stem cell transplants, and possibly radiation. He has already endured several lengthy hospital stays and began receiving the first of his stem cell transplants this fall.

Since his diagnosis, Branson has received 12 blood and 11 platelet transfusions.

Of the transfusions, Austin said, "They have been so important to keep him as healthy, active and battle-ready, as possible. This is the hardest thing our family has ever faced. However, there is hope in the generosity of strangers who are helping to heal my brave boy."

Blood and platelet donations truly are the gift of life."

Rev. Lawrence B. Milliken was born Octo-

ber 28, 1932 and passed away on November 1, 2005. He graduated Salutatorian from Dunbar High School in Mayfield, KY in 1950 and went on to graduate from Kentucky State College in Frankfort, KY in 1954 with a B.S. in Heath and Physical Education. He received a M.A. in Guidance in 1972 and a M.S. in Vocational Technical Education from Murray State University in 1977. He completed a course in Industrial Supervision at Murray State University and received Certification for Administrative, Supervision and Coordination of Vocational Education and a Rank I Certification. He was a member of the Psi Psi Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc.

Rev. Milliken served in the U.S. Army from 1955 to 1957 as a Surveyor Specialist and Battalion and Survey Sergeant until he received an Honorable Discharged. Rev.

Milliken taught for the Graves County Board of Education in 1958; Murray City Board of

Education from 1960 to 1963; and the Paducah City Board of Education from 1963 to 1966 where he taught Adult Education and coached football, basketball, track and baseball at Lincoln High School.

Rev. Milliken began his counseling career as a part-time Juvenile Counselor at the McCracken County Juvenile Court from 1967 to 1968; Industrial Counselor at Union Carbide Corporation in Murray, KY and Counselor-Recruiter for Paducah Area Construction Advancement Foundation from 1970 to 1971; as well as Counselor at Union Carbide Corporation in Paducah, KY from 1971 to 1973. Rev. Milliken held various positions at West KY State Vocational-Technical School as Guidance Counselor, Director of Financial Aid and Department Head of Student Services from 1971 until his retirement in 1989.


Rev. Milliken served as pastor at Mt. Olivet Baptist Church, McKenzie, TN, Second Christian Church, Mayfield,

Rev. Milliken was appointed by the Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky to a three-year term as a Member of the State Advisory Council for Vocational Education; Past Vice-President for Guidance of Kentucky Vocational Association and Member of State Student Financial Aid Training Project Steering Committee of Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority. He was also a Member of American Vocational Association; West Kentucky Vocational Association; West Kentucky Association for Counseling and Development; and Kentucky Association for Student Financial Aid Administrators.

Rev. Milliken was married to Rosetta Dismukes Milliken and the parents of George, Mark (deceased), Millette and Jonessa Milliken, and have five



grandchildren.

## Energy and Environment Cabinet announces Grants to clean up illegal open dumps in 20 Kentucky counties

FRANKFORT, Ky. (Jan. 15, 2019) - Kentucky Energy and Environment Cabinet Secretary Charles Snavely today announced that approximately \$1.15 million in grant funding has been awarded for the cleanup of 77 illegal dumps in 20 counties across the Commonwealth.

"This grant program has significantly reduced the number of illegal open dumps across the commonwealth," Sec. Snavely said. "I encourage all counties to consider using this grant to keep our beautiful Kentucky communities clean and attractive."

The following counties received grants: Breathitt, Bullitt, Butler, Calloway, Cumberland,

Green, Hardin, Harlan, Hart, Louisville-Jefferson County Metro Government, LaRue, Lawrence, Lyon, Marion, Marshall, Pike, Russell, Warren, Whitley and Wolfe.

As part of the grant funding, counties must agree to provide a 25-percent match of the grant amount. The Energy and Environment Cabinet (EEC) may waive the 25 percent match on any illegal open dump where cleanup costs exceed \$50,000.

Funding for the Illegal Open Dump Grant program comes from the Kentucky Pride Fund. The Kentucky Pride Fund is generated through a \$1.75 environmental remediation fee

for each ton of garbage dumped at Kentucky municipal solid waste landfills. This "tipping fee" was first authorized by the 2002 General Assembly under House Bill 174, for use in a dump cleanup reimbursement program, and for the remediation of historic landfills. In 2006, Senate Bill 50 changed the reimbursement program to a grant program, and expanded the scope of the fund to address household hazardous waste collection and recycling infrastructure.

## Morant Named OVC POW - Racers Get Top-25 Votes

It was an eventful Monday for the Murray State Racers as Ja Morant racked up more weekly honors and the Racers received votes in a national poll. Morant was voted the Ohio Valley Conference men's basketball Player of the Week Monday for the fifth time this season for the week of Jan. 7-13.

The sophomore from Dalzell, S.C. was a unanimous selection in a vote by the league's sports information directors.

He started the week with a monster game at UT Martin (Jan. 10) with 26 points and 18 assists. Morant's game set the MSU single-game assist record as he surpassed the 1997 mark of 16 assists by MSU's Chad Townsend (vs Eastern Illinois). Morant was just two off the OVC assist record of 20 by Middle Tennessee's James Johnson in 1986 (Vs Freed-Hardeman).

After a 17 point/14 assist game at Southeast Missouri (Jan. 12), Morant averaged 21.5 points per game and 16 assists for the week. Morant is the No. 1 player in the nation in assist rate at 56.4 percent.

With a fifth weekly honor, Morant ties Cameron Payne (2013-15), Isaac Spencer (1997-01), Lamont Sleets 1979-84 and Glen Green (1979-83) for sixth place all-time in total OVC Player of the Week awards. Isaiah Canaan (2009-13) and Marcus Brown

(1992-96) each set the bar for the Racers with 10 career honors each. Popeye Jones (1988-92) and Jeff Martin (1986-89) each had seven and Frank Allen (1989-93) was honored six times.

The Racers travel north this week looking to improve on their 4-0 start in OVC play. MSU (13-2) plays Thursday at Eastern Illinois in a 7 p.m. tip at Lantz Arena in Charleston and Saturday at SIUE in the Vadalabene Center in Edwardsville, Ill.

When the Associated Press Top-25 Poll was released Monday, the Racers learned they were getting votes for the first time this season and for the first time since 2015. With nine total points in the votes, the Racers are No. 36 in the country this week. The Racers received two votes for 23rd place and three votes for 25th place.

## 23-Year FLW veteran earns \$125K

ROOKELAND, Texas (Jan. 14, 2019) – After fishing the FLW Tour for 23 years, competing in his 168th career event, Rapala pro Terry Bolton of Benton, Kentucky, finally got it done. Bolton earned his first career victory in a dramatic final-day weigh-in Monday at the FLW Tour at Sam Rayburn Reservoir presented by Polaris after bringing a five-bass limit totaling 17 pounds, 6 ounces to the scale.

Bolton's four-day total of 20 bass weighing 91-3

earned him the victory by a 12-ounce margin over second-place pro Nick LeBrun of Bossier City, Louisiana, and the \$125,000 first-place prize.

"This is pretty big for me," said Bolton, a 13-time FLW Cup qualifier. "I was going to retire at the end of last year, but my wife talked me into coming back. I didn't think that I'd ever see this moment and today, it finally happened."

This is only 30 years in the making right here."

Bolton caught most of his fish throughout the event – including his entire 33-pound,

9-ounce Day Two limit – in an area that he

described as a drain or void in a grassline.

He said the key for him

was working his crankbaits at different depths around the grasslines.

"I threw a Rapala DT10 (demon), DT14 (demon) and DT16 (Caribbean shad) to make

sure that I could hit the different depths,"

Bolton said. "I had one

drain that was really

special that I found at

3:30 on the last day of

practice. I idled across

it and saw them all on

the depth finder, made

two casts and caught

a 6-pounder and a 2½-pounder.

I left right away and didn't really

know what was there."

"I caught 20 pounds, 10 ounces there the first day and left it at 12:30," Bolton continued.

"Then, I pulled in the next day and got up to 27-28 pounds and was going to leave but I was afraid that a local boat would get in there. I decided to stay

and then, lo and be-

hold, I catch the 9-8 and end up weighing in 33 pounds. I don't know if you call it dumb luck or a good decision, but staying there Friday is what won me this tournament."

Bolton said that he also mixed in a chartreuse and white-colored ¾-ounce Accent Lures spinnerbait with double-willow blades to catch a couple of keepers throughout the week. He credited his 7-foot, 11-inch Lew's rod paired with a Lew's BB1 Pro reel as being crucial to his success.

"That Lew's crankbait rod and reel combo is truly the best on the planet," Bolton said.

"The key for me was definitely the crankbaits. I had to put the bait just above them in order to get bit."

Overall there were 49 bass weighing 160 pounds, 6 ounces caught by pros Monday. Nine of the final 10 pros weighed in five-bass limits.

FLW television is also distributed internationally to FLW partner countries, including Canada, China, Italy, Korea, Mexico, Portugal, Spain and South Africa.

The total purse for the FLW Tour at Sam Rayburn Reservoir presented by Polaris was more than \$860,000, including \$9,000 through 65th place in the Pro Division. The tournament was hosted by the Jasper County Development District. The next event for FLW Tour anglers will be the FLW Tour at Lake Toho presented by Ranger Boats, in Kissimmee, Florida, Feb. 7-10. The tournament will be hosted Experience Kissimmee and the Kissimmee Sports Commission.

In FLW Tour competition, the full field of 170 pro anglers competed in the two-day opening round Thursday and Friday. The top 30 pros based on their two-day accumulated weight advanced to fish on Saturday. Competition was postponed on Sunday due to inclement weather, so the top 10 pros continued the competition Monday, with the winner determined by the heaviest accumulated weight from the four days of competition.

## The History of Martin Luther King Jr.

### Martin Luther King's Childhood and Education:

Martin Luther King, Jr. was born on January 15, 1929 in Atlanta, GA. His birth certificate listed his first name as Michael but this was later changed to Martin. His Grandfather and then his Father both served as the pastor of the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, Georgia. King graduated from Morehouse College in 1948 with a degree in Sociology. He further received a Bachelor's of Divinity in 1951 and then a Ph.D. from Boston College in 1955. It was in Boston where he met and later married Coretta Scott. They had two sons and two daughters together.

### Becoming a Civil Rights Leader:

Martin Luther King, Jr. was appointed the pastor of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama in 1954. It was while serving as pastor of the church that Rosa Parks was arrested for refusing to give up her seat on a bus to a white man. This occurred on December 1, 1955. By December 5, 1955, the Montgomery Bus Boycott had begun.

### Montgomery Bus Boycott:

On December 5, 1955, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was unanimously elected president of the Montgomery Improvement Association which led the Montgomery Bus Boycott. During this time, African-Americans refused to ride the public bus system in Montgomery. King's home was bombed due to his involvement. Thankfully his wife and baby daughter who were home at the time were unharmed. King was then arrested in February on the charges of conspiracy. The boycott lasted 382 days. In the end on December 21, 1956, the Supreme Court ruled that racial segregation on public transportation was illegal.

### Southern Christian Leadership Conference:

The Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) was formed in 1957 and King was named its leader. Its goal was to provide leadership and organization in the fight for civil rights. He used the ideas of civil disobedience and peaceful protests based on the writings of Thoreau and the actions of Mohandas Gandhi to lead the organization and the fight against segregation and discrimination. Their demonstrations and activism helped lead to the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

### Letter from a Birmingham Jail:

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was a major part of many nonviolent protests as he helped lead the fight for desegregation and equal rights. He was arrested numerous times. In 1963, numerous "sit-ins" were staged in Birmingham, Alabama to protest segregation in restaurants and eating facilities. King was arrested during one of these and while he was imprisoned wrote his famous "Letter from a Birmingham Jail." In this letter he argued that only through visible protests would progress be made. He argued that it was an individual's duty to protest and in fact disobey unjust laws.

### Martin Luther King's "I Have a Dream" Speech:

On August 28, 1963, the March on Washington led by King and other Civil Rights Leaders took place. It was the largest demonstration of its kind in Washington, D.C. up to that time and approximately 250,000 demonstrators were involved. It was during this March that King gave his awe-inspiring "I Have a Dream" speech while speaking from the Lincoln Memorial. He and the other leaders then met with President John F. Kennedy. They asked for many things including an end to segregation in public schools, greater protections for African-Americans, and more effective civil rights legislation amongst other things.

### Nobel Peace Prize:


In 1963, King was named Time Magazine's Man of the Year. He had stepped onto the world stage. He met with Pope Paul VI in 1964 and then was honored as the youngest person ever to receive the Nobel Peace Prize. He was awarded this on December 10, 1964 at the age of thirty-five. He gave the entire amount of the prize money to help with the Civil Rights movement.

### Selma, Alabama:

On March 7, 1965, a group of protesters attempted a march from Selma, Alabama to Montgomery. King was not part of this march because he had wanted to delay its start date until the 8th. However, the march was extremely important because it was met by terrible police brutality that was captured on film. The March was attempted again and the protesters successfully made it to Montgomery on March 25, 1965 where they heard King speak at the Capitol.

### Assassination:

Between 1965 and 1968, King continued with his protest work and fight for Civil Rights. King became a critic of the War in Vietnam. While speaking from a balcony at the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tennessee on April 4, 1968, Martin Luther King was assassinated. The day before he gave a poignant speech where he, "[God's] allowed me to go up to the mountain. And I've looked over. And I've seen the promised land. I may not get there with you." While James Earl Ray was arrested and charged with the assassination, there have been and still are questions to his guilt and whether there was a larger conspiracy at work.




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## January 26 meeting of the Jackson Purchase Historical Society to focus on Murray-born Civil Rights Leader, T.R.M. Howard

The Jackson Purchase Historical Society recognizes the City of Murray's One Hundred Seventy Fifth Anniversary with a presentation by David T. Beito (U. of Alabama) and Linda Royster Beito (Stillman College) on "T. R. M. Howard: Doctor, Entrepreneur, Civil Rights Pioneer, and Murray Native" at 10:30 am in the Auditorium of the Wrather Museum at Murray State University on January 26.

"We are pleased to bring T. R. M. Howard to the attention of the people of the Jackson Purchase and especially those in his hometown of Murray," Society President Bill Mulligan said. "Born in Murray in 1908 he went on to be a major figure in the early Civil Rights movement in Mississippi. A medical doctor he established clinics, founded a bank, and was an early advocate for civil rights in Mississippi before moving to Chicago, where he established a clinic and continued his civil rights work," Mulligan continued. "Without giving away the whole program, he was sponsored by Will and Ora Mason in his education, familiar names in Murray history. From Murray he became a national figure. The Beitos' book tells his story well and is based on a great deal of research. I am pleased we were able to bring them here to

speak," he concluded.

David T. Beito is professor of history at the University of Alabama and Chair, State Advisory Committee, U.S. Commission on Civil Rights. Linda Royster Beito is professor of social sciences and at Stillman College. They have published a num-

ber of articles and book chapters on Dr. Howard and two books on his life.

In 1958, a group of people interested in local and regional history met in Murray, Kentucky and formed the Jackson Purchase Historical Society to promote interest, study, and preservation of the regional history of

the territory included in the Chickasaw Purchase of 1818-19. Andrew Jackson (before he was president) and Isaac Shelby negotiated the treaty with the Chickasaw Nation represented by Levi Colbert and family. Jackson played the leading role in the negotiations. The Treaty was ratified in 1819 and opened the region to full settlement. The area of primary interest to the Jackson Purchase Historical Society includes the Kentucky counties of Ballard, Carlisle, Calloway, Fulton, Graves, Hickman, Marshall, and McCracken and Henry, Lake, Obion, and Weakley in Tennessee. We have an interest in, and welcome members, from all of West Tennessee. However, the Society's interest in the general heritage of this region extends to bordering counties and larger issues that have affected the region and the lives of its people. In 2018, we will celebrate our sixtieth anniversary of service to the region.

The Journal of the Jackson Purchase Historical Society has made an important contribution over the years and has received awards from the Historical Society of Kentucky in 2013 and 2017. Our meetings share current research with the community of those interested.

Membership is open to all for \$15 per year (August to July) and includes a copy of our annual journal.

As Kentuckians, we should take pride in knowing that the Commonwealth is finally being recognized for all the reasons we love our state.

Kentuckians unquestionably recognize agriculture as one of our state's vital industries. With a projected \$5.7 billion in agricultural sales in 2018, according to UK agriculture economists, there is no doubt how important agriculture is to our state.

Meanwhile, tourism sales, as represented by visitor expenditures, reached a record high level of \$9.2 billion in 2017. Even though tourism drives nearly \$3.5 billion more in economic impact, Kentuckians don't often recognize tourism's major importance to our state's economy. But that can change as Kentuckians realize the explicit impact tourism has on their everyday lives.

The economic impact of tourism not only helps local businesses, but it is a major boon to state and local tax coffers to the tune of \$1.57 billion each year. Or to put it another way, each Kentucky family would have to pay an additional \$1,200 each year in taxes if it were not for the tax dollars generated by our tourism industry.

Kentucky's tourism impact is felt beyond its direct benefits by also serving as a powerful marketing tool for products made in Kentucky including bourbon, Corvettes, Toyotas, Louisville Slugger baseball bats, and Ale-8-One, to name a few. Producers of these and other products have come to understand that offering visitor experiences such as tours and museums builds brand awareness and loyalty, which ultimately drives sales.

Consider some of tourism's impressive economic attributes: tourism possesses a unique distinction as a statewide industry that benefits local economies throughout every corner of the commonwealth, a claim that few industries can make. In fact, there is no better Kentucky industry fostering small businesses and entrepreneurs than tourism. And with Kentucky's increasing appeal to foreign tourists, tourism is becoming one of Kentucky's fastest growing exports.

The General Assembly faces a myriad of difficult issues that often boil down to too few dollars to address too many problems. In the midst of those issues, the tourism wave continues to grow, carrying with it more revenue, more jobs and more economic activity. Legislators' investment in tourism promotion only increases this boom for Kentucky's economy.

As one of Kentucky's most powerful economic engines, our industry looks forward to helping legislators hit the accelerator, avoid the brakes, and capture increasing opportunities that come from being a tourism state.

## Creating outstanding teens

There are two important keys to getting the best from your teens. The first is to have a rock solid family foundation, and the second is to nurture a strong two-way connection with your kids.

The way to create a rock solid foundation is two-fold. Parental agreement on child rearing is one of them. It is said that the second

most common reason for divorce is parental disharmony over child management. If you don't present a united front then kids will go for the weakest link every time. You also need to create a strong set of family values. Examples of these values are respect, commitment, honesty, integrity, forgiveness, obedience, loyalty and a great work ethic. There are many more.

Identifying values will, in themselves, not change your family culture unless you describe what each of those values should look like in action.

You might say that "respect in our home means we speak kindly to one another and do not raise our voices in frustration", or,

"respect means that we don't take each others' stuff without asking, and we give it back promptly", and so on.

These action statements become family expectations. You then train yourselves and your kids, to live by those values.

Not only do values provide clear expectations for you and your children to live by, but they also help to create a family identity.

A positive identity promotes a sense of family pride that evokes a positive sense of belonging.

When people think of your family, what characteristics do they observe? Is it a strong sense of loyalty and commitment amongst family members? Is it a family that thinks

of others before themselves, or maybe ones that demonstrate a strong sense of responsibility for the environment?

How do you nurture

a two-way connection with your teens? You will get a head start if you start from the time they are born. We know that with blended families, this is not always possible, but valuable nonetheless. Here are some pointers.

1. Take your kids seriously. Value their opinions and ideas.

2. Encourage them to dream big. Go to their games and school functions when they ask you to, or even if they don't.

3. Give them your time AND attention. When teens know you are listening to them and not judging every word they say, they will feel more confident to talk to you about their feelings.

4. Be a good role model. Act like you want them to act or your credibility will go straight out the window. 'Do as I do and do as I say'.

5. Ask for forgiveness when you make a poor judgment call regarding them.

6. Train them how to face the responsibilities they will encounter as adults such as how to manage money. Allow your teen to make mistakes in the safety of the home, but ensure that you show them appropriate responses to situations.

7. Teach them how to show respect for their girlfriend or boyfriend on dates.

Expose your kids to a wide range of interests so they become more interesting people and

others may then be more likely to hang out with them. Wider knowledge helps them become more outwardly focused because they are more aware of where they fit in the greater scheme of things, and recognize what others' needs are. Teens will make wiser decisions when they can tap into a wider knowledge base. Encourage leadership in them. Have high expectations of them. They will rise to your level of expectations so long as those expectations are realistic. Give them increasing responsibilities, and encourage them to take on some challenges (under supervision).

Support them in what they excel at and don't be tempted to live out your unfulfilled dreams through them.

A very important footnote is to remember that your teens need to understand they are part of your family.

They do not rule the home just because they are bigger and noisier than you may be. You do. Do not be their pal. They don't want to be pack leader.

They really do want you to be their parents.

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## Education & Enrichment Facet from 2018 National Citizen Survey Shows Results Higher than Benchmark in Cultural/Arts/Music Category

**PADUCAH** – The City of Paducah is reviewing the results from the National Citizen Survey™ with this release focusing on Education & Enrichment. Questions associated with Education & Enrichment are related to preschool, K-12, and adult education, library services, religious events and opportunities, and cultural, arts, and music activities.

One of the questions in this category asks residents to rate the opportunities to attend cultural, arts, and music activities in Paducah. This question has had significant increases in positive results since the question was asked of Paducah residents in the 2013 National Citizen Survey. In

2013, this question resulted in a 50% positive response. That number increased to 69% in 2016 and to 75% in the 2018

survey. With the 75% positive responses, Paducah is higher than the benchmark, a comparison to other cities across the nation that recently took this survey.


Mayor Brandi Harless says, "Providing a variety of arts, cultural, and music activities is an important aspect of Paducah's quality of life. Our partner organizations are responsible for making this possible. I want to thank them for the enriching programming that they offer."

An impressive result in the Education & Enrichment facet focuses on the McCracken County Public Library. The Library has had 81%, 82%, and 87% positive results in the 2013, 2016, and 2018 surveys respectively. Regarding K-12 education, the positive results are trending upward with the results increasing

from a 64% in the 2013 survey to 79% in the most recent survey.

City Manager Jim Arndt says, "The National Citizen Survey provides a snapshot of our community in time. Seeing these vital categories such as education, library services, and access to cultural, arts, and music activities consistently increase is an indicator of the vibrancy and overall health of our community. These results also show that numerous agencies and organizations are striving to be the best that they can be in providing services and

## Deadline to Apply for Trade Mitigation Payments Extended

**FRANKFORT** – Agriculture Commissioner Ryan Quarles has alerted Kentucky farmers that the deadline has been extended for agricultural producers to apply for payments under the Market Facilitation Program as provided by the trade mitigation program administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The original deadline had been January 15, 2019, but farmers have been unable to apply for the program since the lapse in federal funding caused the closure of USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices at the end of business on December 28, 2018.
