Fall guided hikes this weekend

The River-to-River Trail Society announces that on Saturday, November 10, it will offer its seventh and eighth guided hikes of the Fall, 2018 hiking season. These will be alternative hikes, offered on the same day. Both hikes are free and open to the public. For both hikes, boots or sturdy shoes are recommended. Hikers should bring their own water and a snack. No dogs, please.

The longer and more challenging hike will cover about five to six miles on the Crest Trail, from the Tecumseh statue, across Eagle Mountain, via Cave Hill and Sunrise Rocks, to the Old Stone Face. This will be a hike of moderate difficulty, requiring some uphill hiking, and is intended for people in good health who have already done some hiking. Hikers should meet at 10:00 a.m. at the Tecumseh statue at Glen O. Jones Lake, Saline County Fish and Wildlife Area, about eight miles southeast of Harrisburg, Illinois and about three miles southwest of Equality, Illinois.

The alternative hike is intended for people looking for a less demanding hike through beautiful Giant City State Park. This will be a multi-trail hike of about two and one half miles. Co-leaders will be a representative of the Society and a member of the Park's staff. Hikers should meet at 10:30 a.m. at the Giant City Visitor's Center, 235 Giant City Road, Makanda, Illinois.

Radio Piano, Sound and Visual Art on WKCTC Clemens Fine Arts Center Stage Nov. 10 - SIU's Jay Needham, Creator of Unique Craft

PADUCAH, KY - The beginnings of radio began in the late 19th century with Guglielmo Marconi's coded transmitted signals that traveled just a few miles. While radio has grown exponentially since then, it's also changed and adapted for new types of audiences, delivery methods and innovations. This includes an idea for sound artist, composer and teacher Jay Needham, who has taken radio transmission to a new and unique level.

Needham, who teaches at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, will showcase his sound art work with Radio Piano in West Kentucky Community and Technical College's Clemens Fine Art Center November 10 at 7:30 p.m. The presentation is free and open to the public. Doors open at 7 p.m.

Needham's Radio Piano is a composition for extended piano and concert hall that involves the use of discrete FM transmissions from within and around a grand piano. Each performance is unique as the composition is created by gathering live radio signals and remixing their energies and content for transmission to the audience.

"Radio Piano is part of our Exposure Series that makes it possible for audiences and artists to join together for exploring ideas about our world with an interdisciplinary and more education-based approach. Jay creates a visionary performance and brings the audience and artist together on the stage where he combines the analog and digital worlds to create sounds that disperse into the ether," said Clemens Fine Arts Center Director Todd Birdsong. "Most people know what a piano is and what a radio is and how they both work. Jay redefines your understanding of these two things and introduces us to a new and unique way of seeing and experiencing these everyday objects."

Needham works across multiple creative platforms, striving to affect positive change and to bridge the gap between the

Pruitt elected treasurer of ten-state MRPC

The Mississippi River Parkway Commission, a ten-state organization with a mission to preserve, enhance and promote the Great River Road running along both sides of the Mississippi River from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico, held its annual meeting October 23-25 in West Memphis, Arkansas. Celebrating its eighty-year history in Great River Road projects and improvements, the organization elected a new slate of officers to continue its important work. The group elected Norma Pruitt, a Kentucky Commissioner and its Marketing Committee Chair, to serve as its

Pruitt, who serves as the director of the Retail Entrepreneurial Assistance Program for the Fulton-Hickman County Economic Development Partnership, Inc. and has served since 2014 on the MRPC, said she is excited about the opportunity to serve the MRPC in a new role. "I have enjoyed tremendously working with representatives from the ten states to market and further develop the travel and tourism opportunities along all the Great River Road. I have learned so much from some of the other states that we have been able to utilize in improving the expe-

River Region Organization, Inc., a partnership involving Ballard, Carlisle, Hickman and Fulton Counties, Pruitt administered a grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation to place signage throughout the entire Purchase region directing travelers to the Great River Road in the river counties, as well as signage throughout those counties providing directions to sites and attractions therein, including the Bengel route of the Kentucky Trail of Tears. The group particularly applauded Pruitt's vision for the signs located at each county's border stating "Entering Kentucky Great River Road Region". Many other MRPC states have received similar signage grants, but none have utilized the funds for placing the signage as far away from the

actual route to expand the reach of the GRR. In its annual meeting, the Transportation Committee applauded the success of Pruitt's signage approach and indicated at least two other states along the GRR are now planning to do begin working on similar approaches in their state signage plans.

Center for Health & Wellness recognizes national Diabetes Month in November

During National Diabetes month, The Center for Health and Wellness of Murray Hospital is promoting awareness of diabetes with screenings and an open house. The public is invited to participate in education and diabetes screening on Wednesday November 14th, World Diabetes Day.

Diabetes, a chronic long lasting disease that effects how your body uses food for energy, can cause many devastating health problems including heart disease, stroke, limb amputation, end-stage kidney disease, blindness – and death. Currently 9 percent of the population in the United States and 14 percent in Kentucky has diabetes, and 1 in 4 people don't know they have it. Among the different types of diabetes, type 2 diabetes is the

most prevalent, and the most preventable. In addition, health experts now recognize pre-diabetes, a condition where blood glucose is higher than normal but not high enough to be diagnosed as diabetes, as being a risk factor for the same conditions as diabetes.

In Calloway County, over 30% of the adult population is considered obese and 20% don't get enough physical activity, two major risks factors for type 2 diabetes. It is important for people with diabetes and pre-diabetes to eat healthy, be physically active and maintain a healthy weight.

"Diabetes awareness has improved over the past 10 years, but there are still a lot of misconceptions out there," says Keena Miller, Director of Health and Wellness at Murray

Hospital. "Diabetes effects many decisions a person makes throughout every day. It's not just about what to eat, but when to see their doctor, how much and what kind of exercise to do, and how to take medications." Miller points out that because health care costs of a person with diabetes is 2 times greater than someone without diabetes, it can also be a financial burden on the family.

The Wellness Center is screening for diabetes and cholesterol from 6 – 9 am on November 14. A 12 hour fast is required. Other activities during the open house include nutrition information, give-a-ways and special membership discounts all day long, free chair massages from 9 am to noon and free samples from FitMeals Murray

How to donate blood

Simply download the American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org or call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood.org/RapidPass or use the Blood Donor App.





A panel of WKCTC students, staff, and members of the community will be discussing race relations in the stories of Water Street.





VICTORIOUS *Living*...in a troubled world

God knows just where you are.

The Biblical story of Jonah is one of hope and forgiveness, but the message grinds on the nerves of the preacher. He did not want hope, or forgiveness, to be offered to the people of Nineveh.

In the biblical story, God asked Jonah to deliver a gift of forgiveness to the wicked people of Nineveh. Jonah did not want to go. The Assyrians were known for their brutally cruel treatment of warriors captured in battle. No one wanted to be captured by the merciless Assyrian army. And, here, God is asking Jonah to walk right into their midst and preach! No way was he going to do that if he could avoid it! Jonah was probably plagued with thoughts of being captured and

skinned alive. Or, drug through the streets until he died as he had heard happened in Nineveh.

Not only did fear plague Jonah's thoughts, but somewhere in the recesses of his mind he knew if he went to Nineveh and preached they might repent and God would not punish them for their history of cruelty. Jonah wanted them to be punished. In his mind, they were too bad, too sinful, to deserve God's mercy. Ironically, that is exactly what happened. God extended mercy. When Jonah finally decided to do as God asked (after a three-day stay in the belly of a whale) he walked into Nineveh and preached up and down the streets telling them that judgement was coming. Upon hearing Jonah's message, at the king's

command, every person in the city repented and for nearly 100 years judgement was stayed. That made Jonah mad. Jonah said, "I knew you'd be merciful and that's why I didn't want to go!" I can imagine Jonah thinking, "If I'm going to go preach, I want to see some results. I want to see some punishment on these people. They don't deserve mercy! They should pay for the way they have treated other people." Isn't it amazing that he was unhappy when he was an eye witness

to the greatest revival in history? An entire city, thousands upon thousands, bowed down and repented as a result of his preaching. Sadly, that wasn't the results he wanted. He wanted judgement. Punishment. He had the same attitude many people in our day have. You've often heard, "We want mercy for ourselves, but judgement for other sinners." God extends mercy to everyone who repents. To me, that's the moral of the story of Jonah. It's an ongoing saga about people running

from God; trying to tell God what to do; getting angry when he does something that they don't agree with. And, God remains merciful. The fact that God is greater than humans seems to scream from the pages of the book of Jonah. He is greater in mercy. He is greater in forgiveness. He is greater in power. He has control over both man and animals. Jonah was so angry when God offered forgiveness, rather than death to the sinners, that he said, "I'd rather just die myself than see you be merciful to them and not make them pay for what they've done to so many people. The truth is, repentance changes everything. Judgement would have fallen had they not repented. God's grace is beyond anything we can

imagine. Who do you and I know that is confused and makes a lot of wrong choices? God wants us to show them compassion. We can't love the sin, but we can love the person. Jonah's message is to all of us. Who do we mark off as undeserving? When have we ran from God? Jonah found out that no one can run from God. "Can a man hide himself in secret places so that I cannot see him?" declares the LORD. "Do I not fill heaven and earth?" declares the LORD" (Jeremiah 23:24). In the belly of the whale, he realized God was with him everywhere he went. He is with you, too. Jonah's message was hope and forgiveness to even the vilest of men. Thank God, it is available to all of us.



Many couples go into marriage now not expecting to last the distance, yet they still make the lifelong promise. Others skip the 'promise' bit altogether and just live together 'without ties'. Some make promises with good intentions, but are prepared to break them when their situation doesn't suit or match the promise any more. It is the stuff country music songs thrive on. Ultimately, a broken marriage devastates not only the couple but also children. We need to be very careful what we promise our children. It can be anything from a promise to take them to the movies, to go on a vacation, to be at their soccer game or to attend their graduation. Kids don't understand why anything else can be more important than that promise. A child's hopes can be dashed by a broken commitment – a promise made without thought. As soon as we declare we are going to do something and fail to do it, not only has our word been broken now, but the child learns they cannot trust our word in the future. This situation has huge implications. When can they be sure we will carry out our word? And,

what is the meaning of a promise anyway. My husband had a girl brought to his office at school. She had been misbehaving and Brian told her he would have to call her mother. She said, "You can call her, but it won't make any difference. She will come storming down here and promise you that she will deal with me when I get home. But she won't. We will get in the car and she won't say another word about it. I can do just about anything I like." "What would you like her to do?" Brian asked. "I would like her to say 'no' sometimes. Then I would know she really loves me," replied the girl. Keeping your word is a sign of respect for another person. If you don't keep your promises, your kids could doubt your love for them. They will also learn that promises are really a 'maybe' and they won't get their hopes up in case they don't come true. They will also learn that there is little meaning in a promise and that they, too, can break their word when it suits them. Our word should be our bond. If we can't be trusted it infiltrates our whole lives and reputations, not only within our families, but also in our jobs and within our whole social network. This is not a legacy we want to pass on to our children. If you are not sure you can carry out a promise, then don't make it. Let's promise ourselves that we will preserve its true meaning. "Personal connections are an excellent way to bring history home to people because they make history personal and real to them. I'm proud of these students for their great work and genuine interest in the history they've encountered."



How to help veterans in need

Millions of men and women serve in the military and make the sacrifices that such service requires. Risking their lives to serve their countries, veterans sometimes endure mental and physical trauma, returning home to face uphill battles as they deal with their injuries.

Many veterans in need are not just in need of medical attention.

Many veterans return home from serving overseas in need of help. Offering such help can improve veterans' lives while letting them know their efforts and sacrifices are appreciated.



Before these activities, a pre-game tailgate concert featuring Nashville recording artist Eric Chesser will begin at 11:30 a.m. in the stadium tailgating area.

arts and the sciences. His sound art, works for radio and visual art have appeared at museums, festivals and on the airwaves worldwide.



River-to-River Trail Society announces launch of official online guide



The River-to-River Trail Society is pleased to announce the publication of its new official online guide to the entire River-to-River Trail. The Trail Guide is now available to all without charge on the Society's website at rivertorivertrail.net, simply by going to the site and then clicking on "Trail Information." Users will have the option of downloading and printing either the entire guidebook, or only those pages covering a particular section of the trail in which they are interested. In addition, users may also download the guide to their smart devices, because the guide is fully hyper-linked for easy navigation. The Trail Guide is intended for both hikers and horsemen, and should prove essential reading to both alike.

The River-to-River Trail stretches 157 miles across Southern Illinois, from Elizabethtown on the Ohio River to Grand Tower on the Mississippi. Following a three year effort to generate updated and accurate maps, and a 2017 re-marking of the entire route, the River-to-River Trail has become one of the premier long distance hiking and equestrian trails in the Midwest, and will now provide an essential boost to outdoor recreation and tourism in Southern Illinois. The new guidebook is being issued by the Society as a part of the same project, and contains maps of up-to-the-minute accuracy.

This is the fifth edition of the Trail Guide, and is the first to be offered free online. It is also the

first revision of the guidebook since 2011. The online format provides the Society with the means to keep the Trail Guide constantly up to date, as changes are made in the route of the Trail or new information becomes necessary or available. The 140 pages of the guidebook contain seventeen chapters detailing each section of the Trail, including the historic eastern section beginning at Battery Rock, as well as chapters on trail safety, equestrian use of the trail, and use of online hiking maps. The maps of all sections of the Trail have been brought up-to-date and checked for accuracy. The information on points of interest near the Trail has been greatly expanded. New to the guidebook are charts showing mileage and changes in elevation along the Trail. The guidebook is copiously illustrated with maps and photographs throughout.

Society Vice President William Gilmour of Metropolis, Illinois is the author of the new edition, with assistance from several other members of the Society. Shawn Gossman, of hikingwithshawn.com, contributed a chapter on trail safety and Keith Kibler, of the Shawnee Trail Conservancy, contributed a separate chapter on riding the trail on horseback. The Society is grateful to the staff of the Shawnee National Forest for their assistance with the maps, and to our advertisers for permitting the Trail Guide to be offered in a format that makes it free to all.

Peyton Wilhoit Wins MVC Golfer of the Week

Coach Hinson press conference ahead of Kentucky matchup

What did you think of Kentucky's game against Duke?

Isn't it amazing? We're all human. I just got off the phone with the Kentucky beat writer, and I said, it just goes to show you no matter what level you play at, whether it's junior high, high school, college, or pro, everyone has one of those nights. No one is immune to it. My read on last night is that they had one of those nights. It was one of those nights for two different reasons. Duke had one of those nights, and Kentucky had one of those nights. All I know is, when we run out of the tunnel on Friday night in front of 23,500 people, I promise you the kids in the white jerseys will be ready to go. I know that for a fact.

What did you see Kentucky do well?

It's what they do. What Kentucky does well is length and athleticism. They do a great job on the offensive glass, and they do a phenomenal job in transition. They really pressure the basketball. I thought there was a huge bang-bang sequence in the first half with two really bad calls that both went against Kentucky. It's easy when you put it on video, but I thought that had a major affect. They had just started cutting into the lead, and they had two bang-bang calls that went against them. One of the calls would have been a flagrant, and they would have received the free throws and the ball out of bounds. That would have been a big moment right there. The other was the travel on a breakaway layup. It could have been a swing of momentum.

How do you control the pace?

The only way you

can control pace is to score. That's it. If we go up there and get in a hole, like we have in the past with high-major teams, it's hard to get out of. We need to get off to a good start. We know there's going to be an unbelievable wave when we start this game. I've known Coach Calipari since 1995. I can tell you I know exactly what's happening today in that locker room, and what's going to happen on that practice floor. It's the same thing that would have happened here at SIU. We know we're going to have to hit the wave right off the bat and withstand that push.

Can you take advantage of their inexperience?

I don't know how much we're going to be able to take advantage of anything at Kentucky. The game plan is pretty simple for us. We have to go in there and do what we've worked on—try to do that and execute that as best as possible. We're playing the all-time winningest program in college basketball, and I'm trying to this game as simple as I can with our players. I'm trying to keep pressure from these guys. The worst thing we can sometimes do as coaches is add to the heat. I don't want to do that. There's enough buildup for this thing as there is. We've put together a game plan. We're going to try to

execute it. We'll see if it works.

Is there an advantage to not having played on Opening Day?

I don't see any advantage. We tried to get a game and couldn't get one. We would have preferred to start on the starting date, but we didn't have the luxury. We couldn't find anybody. Our schedule wouldn't have allowed us. But had we played on Tuesday, we probably wouldn't have been able to play this game, either, so it always works out for you.

How has Kavion Phippen learned how to shoot over length?

We're going to find out Friday night at 6 o'clock, 7 o'clock their time. I don't know how to answer that question until we see. We don't have those guys in our league. There's nobody like Kentucky's length in our league. We're not going to see anybody like Kentucky's length for the rest of the season. We may see one guy, but we won't see multiple lines of that.

What's the biggest question on your team you want answered, win, lose or draw?

You're not going to get all the answers in one game. One of the biggest answers we're going to get: How do you answer adversity?

We're going to learn from mistakes; we're going to learn adversity. We're not going to play in front of a crowd of 23,500 for the entire season. We're 35-40 minutes from Kentucky. We get all the Big Blue Nation reports. We have a ton of Kentucky fans in Jackson County. I watch Coach Cal's show. One of the things we have to do is, how do we handle this going in there? We're going in there with the mindset to do the very best we can do. I've gotten a lot of advice from Coach Kill. He's coached at the highest level. What do you do when you go into the Horseshoe? Do what we do. That's the only thing we're going to ask of our guys. Hopefully at about 9:45 on Friday night, we're going to come out of the game saying we did some good things; we made some mistakes, but I like what I see out of our young men.

How do you prepare for Buffalo three days after you play Kentucky?

We started on Buffalo about three weeks ago. Everyone wants to talk about this game (Kentucky), but when we open up Monday night (vs. Buffalo), we're going against one of the best basketball teams in college athletics. ESPN wrote an article about them two weeks ago: "This is a team that could go to the Final Four." We're going to find out a lot about the Salukis in our first two games. We told our players that. But that's OK. We expect it. That's why we put together this schedule. When I asked Coach (Kill) about the Kentucky game, he said, "Your schedule is already tough enough." But we did it for a reason: to prepare us to win a conference championship. Everything we're doing is to prepare us for postseason play. Hopefully, it will pay off.
